SFO Profession on Par with Religious Profession

Profession in the Secular Franciscan Order is "on par with" and "of equal importance to" profession made by friars or any religious.

That was the opening statement made by Fr. Richard Trezza, OFM, regional and national spiritual assistant, during a workshop on the importance and sacredness of profession. The talk kicked off the regional chapter, held April 16-18 at Stella Maris Retreat Center in Skaneateles

He quoted Br. Felice of Capuchin Franciscans, who declared at the SFO international gathering that the Church recognizes Secular Franciscans as belonging to a real Order, and that profession in the Order is of the same importance as religious profession -- different, but of equal import.

"It is seen by the universal church as the

same thing, as giving ourselves over to God," Father Richard said

Profession has a number of awesome elements:

- It is Holy Spiritdriven: An invitation to vocation Furthermore the minister invokes the person... to be at God's Cangelosi, vicar general Holy Spirit and calls the total disposal. Holy Spirit down on the people being professed.
 - It is a fundamental moment in one's life.
 - It is a unique moment, an intense moment with God
 - It's a ritual done in a public arena, in the presence of the fraternity, and a platform to give a response to God.
 - It's dedicating oneself to service of God's kingdom, and it's

grace-filled, because "we couldn't do that without a big dose of God's grace."

- It's a consecration, a dedication to God's exclusive service while living in the world as a single or married
- It's not a part-time commitment. The professed person becomes God's property, and God is working in that person's life, prodding the transformation It's starting the day thinking one is a vessel waiting to be filled with God's grace. It's praying daily. It's daily conversion... living the Gospel.
 - It glorifies God. Because of the im-

portance and sacredness of profession, it is vital to have a discernment process during formation of candidates.

Profession should take place during Mass, with a friar or priest present to be the witness for the church and Order. he said. He encouraged fraternities to postpone profession until a friar or priest can be scheduled to participate.

"You are Franciscan men and Franciscan women in your own right," he said, and, quoting Brother Felice, he added: "The SFO profession has the dignity of solemn and religious profession and cannot be considered lesser than that of a religious profession."

"You are Secular Franciscans You live in the world and are for the world...You can't use the pious line, 'I'm in the world but not of the world' (the world has been saved). To wish anything else would be a betrayal to your profession."

UTICA FRATERNITY CELEBRATES 150 YEARS

St. Joseph Fraternity celebrated 150 years in Utica on June 6, and marked the occasion by honoring two agencies that serve the poor and marginalized – Mother Marianne's West Side Kitchen and the Rescue Mission of Utica. Minister Katie Koscinski, SFO, presented them with the fraternity's inaugural Mother Marianne Cope Award.

"This is bittersweet," said Rev. Deacon Gil Nadeau, director of West Side Kitchen, because "we just lost one of our volunteers," Tony Weber, 87, who died May 28. Tony came to the soup kitchen Wednesday nights, making "thousands of sandwiches."

"So we dedicate this award to Tony Weber and all the volunteers who never ask for recognition."

Rev. Bill Dodge, Rescue Mission executive director, said he was "awed and humbled" to be accepting an award from Franciscans that is named after Blessed Mother Marianne. He mentioned how Mother Marianne went out of her way to provide amenities to leprosy patients and treated them with dignity.

The day began with recognition for the 150th anniversary during mass at St. Joseph-St. Patrick's Church. Fr. Adam Keltos, OFM

Conv., the banquet speaker, concelebrated mass with Fr. Richard Dellos, pastor, who praised the fraternity's service and made note of special guests that included secular Franciscans from around the state.

During the banquet at Radisson Hotel, Koscinski noted that the award's namesake grew up in Utica and was active in what today is St. Joseph-St. Patrick Church before becoming a Franciscan sister and reaching out to the marginalized of her day.

Just over two years ago, she noted, Deacon Nadeau and Father Dellos challenged parishioners to "come down off the mountain." In less than two months, parishioners and secular Franciscans had come together and opened West Side Kitchen, serving lunch six days a week to the jobless, the working poor and the homeless.

Founded in 1891, the Rescue Mission, she said, serves the poor, the homeless, the mentally ill and those struggling with substance abuse.

Father Keltos, the keynote speaker, encouraged secular Franciscans to study and live their Franciscan Rule of Life.

"It's not long," he said. "It's just hard..." because "it means living the Gospel."

Founded in 1859, St. Joseph held the celebration at the conclusion of the 150th year.



Some 30 to 40 Secular Franciscans attended the "Franciscan Experience" on March 20 in Syracuse, reports Regional Minister Mary Frances Charsky. Many of them got together to pose for a photo. Sponsored by the Sisters of St. Francis, the seminar

featured Sr. Mary Beth Ingham, CSJ, a Duns Scotus scholar. The SFOs were from Buffalo, Rochester, Hilton, Syracuse, Binghamton, Vernon and Utica. "Many of us visited" the Blessed Mother Marianne Shrine, located in the chapel, Mary Frances said.
